A Message From Paul Knox, Scout Executive

It is evident that Scouting has continued to grow in enthusiasm in 2022 as we welcomed a significant increase of youth at Camp Lavigne this summer. In addition to the nearly three hundred youth scouts that attended camp, we also hosted a 4H group during the third week of June and most recent, Camp Courage. Thanks to our passionate volunteers, many improvements were made to the camp including the Pool being completely repaired, a facelift to the interior of Wise Lodge and repairs to the Cooks Cabin. The program at Camp Lavigne expanded back to its original fervor, as the COPE program and Climbing Tower were added back after a dedicated effort of over twenty volunteers raised the needed funds to make it possible.

We are proud to have honored our 2021 Eagle Scouts representing 10 percent of all registered Scouts BSA in the Council and as the year comes to a close, we will add fourteen new Eagles in 2022 and still counting. It was a pleasure host the first ever Eaglepalooza this summer at Camp Lavigne. Families of Riverside Troop 33 recognized the accomplishments of the seven Eagle Scouts their unit has had in the past twelve months, with nearly 150 in attendance. Dr Richard Baker and Victor Marks, MD joined the ranks of our Outstanding Eagles for which are Council has recognized. Finally, we had the privilege of presenting the Distinguished Eagle Scout Award to Dr. James Blankenship, which is the highest honor an Eagle Scout can receive.

This fall we successfully added one hundred new youth to into the Scouting program with our Hometown Pride Scouting theme. A new girl unit, Troop 511 Benton formed in August with five new Scouts joining! The Columbia Montour Council continues to demonstrate its commitment to developing our youth into the leaders of tomorrow and currently stands fourth in the Nation in the percentage of scouts that we serve.

It is because of the persistent dedication of our volunteers and generosity of our donors that the Columbia Montour Council can consistently serve the youth of our local area with a program that sets the example for the Scouting community across the Country.

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2022 Distinguished Eagle Scout Recipient - Dr. James Blankenship

Established in 1969, the Distinguished Eagle Scout Award recognizes Eagle Scouts who achieve extraordinary national level recognition or eminence within their profession while having a strong record of voluntary service to their communities. This is the highest honor an Eagle Scout can achieve with a required minimum "time in service" of 25 years from the date in which the Eagle rank was attained.

Dr. Blankenship, a Interventional Cardiologist and 1970 Eagle Scout, has given his distinguished service to his community and nation as a surgeon of Interventional Cardiology, professor of Medicine, author of countless articles, Scientific Lecturer, served on 19 international medical mission teams, and a past member of the Council Executive Board.
